



CALICO WEBBING COVER (EACH)

This webbing cover, made from hard wearing calico material, is a component not to be forgotten in any 1960s or 1970s MG seat rebuild.

Without a webbing cover, the seat webbing will gradually chafe and abrade the seat base foam in use, resulting in areas of the foam becoming thinner and prematurely weaker, apart from creating an unsightly mess of foam fragments that have to be periodically cleared from under the seat.

The calico cover was the most successful and durable type of webbing cover fitted originally in MG seat assemblies. It is most appropriate for webbing fitted seats in 1970s MGBs and the MGA Deluxe seat, but is also highly effective in the diaphragm fitted seats in 1964-79 Midgets and Sprites and 1960s MGBs.

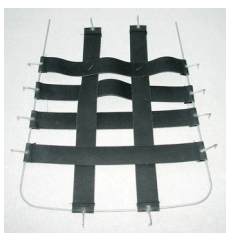


Easy to fit. The webbing cover may be attached to the webbing (or diaphragm) by pushing the webbing hooks through the edges of the calico, accounting for the fact that the webbing is going to stretch as it is fitted to the frame (a method often adopted by the factory). Alternatively, it may be simply glued with aerosol or brush-on upholstery adhesive to the underside of the foam base (favourite for DIYers).



Basic hand tools required. Pliers to push webbing hooks through calico, or aerosol/brush-on upholstery adhesive.

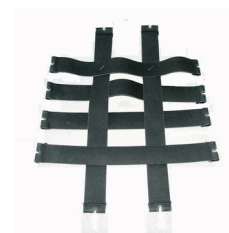
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
